This roundtable discussion will be chaired by **Dr Ruth Slatter** (Lecturer in Historic Environment and Knowledge Exchange Manager, the Institute of Historical Research), and will feature contributions from **Emma Pavey** (Associate Director, the Susanna Wesley Foundation, University of Roehampton), and **Professor Beverley Clack** (Emerita Professor of the Philosophy of Religion, Oxford Brookes University & Visiting Fellow, Harris Manchester College, University of Oxford). Themed around women, ageing, the menopause, and leadership, this roundtable will explore the female experience, both within Methodism and in everyday life.

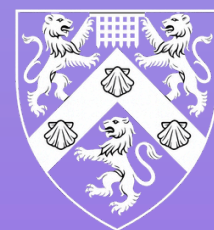
## Conclusion of Event 17.30
